Alumni News: The 1999 Nigerian-Sino-Turkic Alliance Grows Up, Gains Legitimacy

This week the History class is in the throws of a 1956 international summit. While wondering whether the US and the USSR will blow each other up, or whether they will reach better-than-real-life solutions to such problems as the Soviet invasion of Hungary, nuclear disarmament, and Khrushchev's desire to go to Disneyland, it's interesting to look back at another international summit from the past.

In the 1999 summit, North Korea and Afghanistan joined forces; Turkey engineered an anti-Surinam alliance; Nigeria sold off *all* its oil reserves; and

Switzerland made a fortune brokering nuclear weapons before Ann found out and put a stop to it.

By a total coincidence, this week the Kino Connection was going to announce the graduate school plans for three of the major players in the 1999 summit.

Next year, Uri Palmer-Gai (Nigeria, Class of 2001) and Andy Jarms (People's Republic of China, Class of 2000) will both be first year law students. Both Andy and Uri graduated from U of A in 2006.
